They have some interesting "big idea" metrics, such as soil respiration, active carbon, soil protein index, that really seem to emphasize the biological, and other metrics such as "minor elements" that seem to gloss over the details of traditional law of minimums. It's intriguing, and it ain't cheap, at between \$120 and \$150 for the bells and whistles package.

I used to use the Cornell SHT routinely but stopped primarily because they stopped doing the root bioassay test (developed by George Abawi) that gave an indication (though no specificity) about potential soil-borne root pathogens. Additionally, the lag time in reporting results and their glossing over other details such as microelements etc caused me to stop. I can do most of the other tests myself (though a bit more rudimentarily) - so what was the point? I do send samples to EarthFort where I get better detailed results and quicker turnaround, though still nothing to do with root pathogens.
