I have a couple of Big Boy folding type. One is medium pitch (8.5 teeth per inch) and the other the fine pitch (11 tpi). Both are good, the medium cuts a bit faster, and the fine might make a slightly cleaner job, but the difference is minimal. So, yes they are good, but not really better than other good quality pruning saws like ARS or Bahco. What I like of the Big Boy models is the length: the blade is 14 inches (and the handle is same), so you get close to 28 inches total length, which

Gomboy 240mm with a **medium tooth** blade at 8.5tpi [www.silkysaws.com]

PocketBoy 170mm with **large tooth** blade at 7tpi [www.silkysaws.com]

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I use the Gomboy more than the PocketBoy.

I previously had a . . . TakeruBoy 270mm with Extra Fine tooth blades on two sides at 11tpi on the top and 18.6tpi on the bottom [www.silkysaws.com]

Claudes point on the longer saw length for reaching that little further out is a good one. I've gotten on my tippy toes more than a few times while pruning (trying to avoid going back to grab a ladder)

The Silky saws are wonderfully sharp too

Yes you will definitely need 2 saws. For my part I always have a small one in my left back pocket (blade length of 7 to 8" is fine - and I have my Felco pruner in my right back pocket...) and a longer one such as the Big Boy to keep with all the pruning tools. Claude

It cuts well but I find it somewhat uncomfortable to use for long periods of time because of the folding handle design.

When I purchase my next saw I'll be looking at the Gomtaro Fine which is the replacement for the Gomtaro Apple saw. The fixed handle looks like it might be more comfortable to handle and the sheath seems a convenient way to store it. I am always setting the Gomboy down and losing track of it because it doesn't fit well in jacket pocket.
